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The Workshop and Training of Trainers

The IPRED (International Platform for Reducing Earthquake Disaster) is a platform for collaborative research, training and education in the field of seismology and earthquake engineering. Supported by Unesco and driven by the International Institute of Seismology and Earthquake Engineering (IISEE) as the "Centre of Excellence", the objectives of the establishment of this platform are:

- To exchange information and to propose plans on collaborative research, training, and education regarding seismology and earthquake engineering in order to reduce earthquake disaster, especially on buildings and housing.
- To address policy-relevant issues related to the reduction of earthquake disaster risks and implementation of the Hyogo Framework for Action, including making recommendations on priorities of the International Strategy for Disaster Reduction (ISDR).
- To establish a system to dispatch experts to an earthquake stricken country in order to carry out post-earthquake field investigations and draw lessons for future risk reduction, by utilizing the worldwide network of the graduates of training courses organized by the IISEE (over 1300 graduates from some 100 countries).

The 1st Session of the IPRED was held at the UNESCO HQ in Paris in July 2008, attended by representatives of major earthquake-prone countries (Chile, Egypt, Indonesia, Japan, Kazakhstan, Mexico, Peru, Romania, and Turkey), and shared the lessons learned from recent earthquake disasters including the Wenchuan Earthquake, and discussed the future IPRED activities. The 2nd Session was held at Istanbul in July 2009 and then the membership of El Salvador was approved.

The next session of IPRED will be held in Padang-Indonesia on July 6-8, 2010, and hosted by the Research Institute for Human Settlements – the Agency for Research and Development of the Ministry of Public Works - Indonesia, and the Provincial Government of West Sumatera - Indonesia.







Indonesian Seismic Conditions

Located in the intersection of Eurasian plate, Australian plate and Pacific plates makes Indonesia one of the most volcanically and seismically active zones on earth. Indonesia is divided into three earthquake-source zone, they are the subduction zone, the transformation zone (shallow crustal), and the diffuse seismicity zone, those three zones are active. The northward-moving Indo-Australian and the westward-moving Pacific plates form the southeastern extremity of the Southeast Asian lithosphere plate, which makes this country tectonically active zone.



Earthquake Experience in Indonesia

The record of earthquake occurrence in Indonesia for the last five years is essential and has been gathered to get the updated picture of earthquake information in this country. This information can then be used to depict the future trend of earthquake occurrences in Indonesia.

The general profile of earthquake location can be acquired from the epicenter data of +5 Richter magnitudes earthquake recorded in Indonesia since 1900-2009.

There has been several major earthquake occurrences recorded in the last five years, and recently in 2009, the earthquake record of Indonesia is as shown in table below:

In conclusion, supported by the data above, Indonesia is an earthquake-prone country.



About Indonesia

Indonesia, the largest archipelagos in the world, is located between Indian Ocean and Pacific Ocean. Its 17,508 islands and isles span more than 5000 km eastward from Sabang in northern Sumatra to Merauke in Papua, and from Miangas in the north to Timor Island in the south. With its unique location, Indonesia has variety of geographical condition, from the beautiful beaches in Bali and Lombok to the erupting volcanoes in Mount Merapi and Mount Bromo-Semeru, from the wonderful seabed in Bunaken and Raja Ampat to the quiet ice cap in Puncak Jaya, from the dark tropical rain forest in Borneo and Sumatera to the warm savannah in Sumba Island.



Climate

Indonesia is a tropical country, with two distinct monsoonal wet and dry seasons, with its normal temperature ranges between 28-35°C and humidity of 60-70 % in dry season, and it ranges between 25-30°C and humidity of 70-80% in wet season.





Geography

Indonesia is the world's fourth-most populous country with more than 230 million people. Bahasa Indonesia is the national language. Indonesia has around 300 ethnic groups that spread across the islands and isles. Indonesia is a religious country which practices five major religions; Indonesian people are majorly Islam, and partly are Protestant, Catholic, Hindu, and Buddhist.

Time Zone

The archipelago expands across three time zones:

- Western Indonesian Time: GMT+07:00, includes Sumatra, Java, and eastern Kalimantan;
- Central Indonesian Time: GMT+08:00, includes western Kalimantan, Nusa Tenggara, and Sulawesi; and
- Eastern Indonesian Time: GMT+09:00, include the Maluku and Papua.



Cultural Arts and Heritages

Indonesia's cultural heritage varies from its traditional dances to local celebration such as Sekaten and Kasodo ceremony in Java, as well as Ngaben ceremony in Bali. One that has been acknowledged as a world heritage is the batik cloth. Other wellknown cultural heritages are Wayang, traditional weapons such as Keris, Rencong and Mandau, wood sculpture such as Asmat tribe and wood carving in Jepara, traditional musical instrument such as gamelan, angklung, and kulintang, traditional martial art such as pencak silat, and many others.



Flora and Fauna

Indonesia is also the habitat for many unique species varies from rare birds such as cockatoo and the bird of paradise, to endangered mammals such as, Orang Utan, Java rhino, anoa, and uncommon reptile such as Komodo dragon. Here is also the habitat of rare plants such as the Rafflesia arnoldii, wild orchids, fragrant woods and a large variety of fruit trees.











Visa on Arrival

Entering Indonesia without any visa is possible now only for nationals of the following 11 countries and territories: Brunei Darussalam, Chile, Hong Kong Special Area (Hong Kong SAR), Macau Special Area (Macau SAR), Malaysia, Morocco, Peru, the Philippines, Singapore, Thailand and Vietnam. Customs, Currency & Airport Tax regulations

Indonesian's airport customs applies this import regulation, tobacco products (no limitations for diplomats): 50 cigars or 200 cigarettes or 100 grams of tobacco; 1 litre of liquor; a reasonable quantity of perfume; personal goods up to a value of USD 250.- per passenger or USD 1,000.- per family. Indonesian Rupiah's currency is of 1 USD = 9,122.9 IDR. Airport tax will be applied differently of Rp.40,000 for domestic or Rp.150,000 for international departure.

Office Hours

Office hours start from 8 AM to 4 PM, or 9 AM to 5 PM. Lunch break is between 12 noon to 1 PM. Government office hours is 8 AM to 4 PM. Offices are closed on Saturdays, including government offices.

Banking Hours

Standard banking hours are from 8 AM to 3 PM from Monday to Friday. Several banks open their branches in hotels (and some in malls) longer than the office hour, a few are open on Saturdays.

Electricity and WiFi Facilities

Electric power supply is 220 volts in all regions with type C, F and E/F hybrid sockets (socket with two rounded-tip pins plugs). Most hotels and many restaurants in large cities provide internet connections and free WiFi.





Provincial Government of West Sumatera - Indonesia

West Sumatera is a province of Indonesia, lies on the west coast of the Sumatera Island, including the Mentawai islands off the coast. It consists of 12 districts and 7 cities. The highest local government in West Sumatera is led by a governor, which is elected every 5 years by the citizen. The lowest local government unit under the district administration is called nagari.

The Government of West Sumatra has 7 visions for their Province development:


- 1. Improving the quality of the religious and cultural-social life.

About Padang

Padang, the capital city of West Sumatera Province in Indonesia. It is located on the western coast of Sumatra. It has an area of 694.96 square kilometres (268.3 sq mile) and a population of over 750,000 people. Padang as a coastal city has a beautiful sunset scenery. The City still has it's traditional atmosphere, with Rumah Gadang as the traditional house of West Sumatera.

Padang's Culture

Padang, although considered as major city in West Sumatera, still preserves their traditional culture, varies uniquely from their traditional cuisine, dances, building architecture, clothes, and language. Padang cuisine is what Indonesian frequently named their traditional cook; their cuisine generally has spicy flavor and strong taste, such as rendang, dendeng balado, otak-otak, and many more. Persembahan dance is their traditional dance; it is usually performed for the welcoming or openning ceremony. Their traditional cloth named baju kurung (kurung cloth) usually wore in every important ceremony, such as wedding, religion ceremony, etc. The most outward view of their culture is seen on their building architecture, they name it rumah gadang style, typically constructed by stage house and unique roof shape.

Earthquake experiences

Padang is one of the cities located in the earthquake-prone zone. As part of the Sunda megathrust, many earthquakes happened in the past. In 1797 and 1833, two major earthquakes stroke Mentawai Island, off coast Sumatera. It generated tsunamis in Padang and caused severe damage in coastal area in Padang. The latest earthquake stroke Padang in September 30, 2009. The M7.5 earthquake, 80 km depth and 60 km distance devastated many infrastructures in Padang. At least 1,117 people dead, 1,214 injured, 181,665 buildings destroyed or damaged and about 451,000 people displaced in the Padang-Pariaman area. Landslides disrupted the power and communication system in the area.





How to reach Padang

Minangkabau International Airport (PDG) is an international airport of Padang. It is located 23 km from downtown of Padang. It can be accessed both from international flight and domestic flight (transit from Sukarno-Hatta airport in Jakarta). The international flight to Padang is Air Asia from Kuala Lumpur (KLIA), Malaysia.

The transfer flight from Sukarno-Hatta Airport (CGK) in Jakarta is the best way to recommend to the participants, since it has more daily flights to Padang (see attachment for information). The participant can transfer from Terminal-2 (International and Garuda flights terminal) to domestic flight in Terminal-1 or Terminal-3, depends on the airlines. Shuttle buses are provided for transferring participant from one terminal to another. This facility is free of charge.

Public transport



Transfer Between Terminals

A shuttle bus is available between the Domestic and International terminals (Terminal 1 and 2 respectively).

Driving Directions

The airport is located at Cengkareng, Tangerang and is a 30-minute drive (longer in the rush hour) from Jakarta city centre, off the Soediyatmo toll road (Bandara exit).

Car Parking

Short-term and overnight parking is available at both terminals; car parks are a five-minute walk from the terminals. Parking is, however, quite limited.

Car Hire

Avis, Bluebird and Europear all have desks located in the Arrivals areas of both terminals. Chauffeured car hire is available from Golden Bird.

Public Transport

Bus:

The DAMRI shuttle bus route runs between Rawamangun, Blok M, Gambir, Bekasi, Depok and Bogor (journey time - 1 hour).

Taxi:

Taxis can be booked at counters in the Arrivals areas of the terminals (journey time to city centre - 30-45 minutes).

Information and Help Desks

There are information desks in both terminals. There are also 24-hour tourist information desks (tel: (021) 550 5179 or 5307/8/9) in Terminal 2 (International Terminal).

Airport Facilities

Money and communications

Terminal 1 has banks, a bureau de change and a post office.

Terminal 2 has banks, bureau de change facilities and ATMs, a post box and 24-hour telecommunications services, including fax and telex. Telephones are provided in both terminals; free local dialling is provided in the waiting lounges.

Eating and drinking: There are various food outlets in both terminals.

Shopping: There are numerous shops including duty-free, a gift shop, newsagents and bookshop. **Luggage**: Left-luggage is located in Terminal 2 (hall D), while lost property offices are situated in the Arrivals areas of both terminals. A porter service is available.

Other facilities: First aid facilities are available at the administrative offices. Terminal 2 also has a baby care room and prayer rooms.

Conference and Business Facilities

Executive lounges are situated in the transit lounge, in the Departures area of Terminal 2, as well as a number of airline lounges; a VIP lounge is situated in the Departures area of Terminal 1. Several meeting rooms are available for hire at the nearby Sheraton Bandara.

Facilities for Disabled Travellers

There are toilets and a lift for disabled passengers. Wheelchairs can also be provided on request; passengers requiring assistance should inform their airline prior to travel.

Objects of Interest in Padang

The local culture of Padang is still outward, it is visualized by the unique architecture of some of the buildings in Padang, their traditional house is called Rumah Gadang, and the unique shape of the roof of the traditional house often be applied to some modern buildings such as hotel, restaurant, etc.

Padang as a coastal city is also known as a tourism gate of West Sumatera. There are several long shores that surround Padang, such as Padang Beach, Puruih Beach and Aie Manih Beach, as these beaches are located on the west side of Sumatera Island, they have beautiful scenery of sunset.
