Address in Reply on Behalf of All the Participants

I would like to start saying thank you for giving me the extraordinary honor to say these closing words on behalf of all my colleagues and friends of the Seismology, Earthquake Engineering and Tsunami Disaster Mitigation Course 2015-2016. I feel like it was yesterday when we

came to Japan and we were celebrated at the opening ceremony. Certainly, most of us were very nervous because we were just at the beginning of a new challenge in our lives, which is understandable as we, human beings, normally feel fear against the unknown, against those things that are completely new to us. However, the capacity to overcome that fear is what makes us better people and better professionals every day.

During this period we have had the privilege to learn from the amazing Japanese people, who kindly opened the doors of their knowledge and culture to us. We could learn about important fields related to science and technology that will definitely bring improvements to our developing countries. On the other hand, we also have learned many valuable and admirable qualities of the

Japanese culture. Among the many qualities that Japanese people have, I want to focus on their hard work and solidarity, using a Japanese quote, "Dōryoku ni masaru tensai nashi", which means in English, "There is no genius that bests hard work". These two qualities have led the Japanese people to keep united and to successfully overcome even the worst disasters that struck the country in the past. That is what makes Japan a great paradigm for our countries to follow.

I would also like to mention a brief history today which I always try to apply to my daily life. It is about a boy who went to the circus to see some wild animals. He was very scared and surprised when he noticed that the biggest and strongest animal in the circus, an elephant, had only a rope tied to a weak and insignificant wooden stake buried in the ground, whereas, other weaker and smaller wild animals were locked in very resistant cages to prevent from attacking visitors. A man that belonged to the circus explained to the boy, saying "when elephants are small, they are tied to very strong pole. That way, due to their small size and strength, it is impossible for them to get free. Therefore, after trying many times, the elephants give up and they accept "the reality" that they will not be able to get free in their lives." If we analyze this analogy, many similar situations happen in our daily lives. For most of the time our mental barriers limit ourselves to fulfill our goals. Or sometimes, we let the people tell us that we cannot do anything. However, it is up to us if we will try it one more time or if we will give it up forever (like the elephant). It is important to remember that "no matter if you say I can or I cannot, the both ways are right to you". There is only one person who you have to believe in to succeed. That person is you, no one else.

Finally, I want to conclude this speech by expressing our sincere gratitude to IISEE, BRI, JICA and GRIPS for all the knowledge, experiences and trust that have been shared with us during this year. To all my colleagues and friends, thank you for their invaluable support and friendship. Congratulations on this new goal achieved and the best lucks in the new stage of your lives that you are about to start when you return to your countries. Thank you.
